Metastatic cancer, also known as Stage IV cancer, occurs when cancer that started in one organ, such as the breast, ovary or prostate, spreads to other parts of the body, including bone, lungs, liver and brain. It is treatable, but not curable. Though exact statistics are unknown, as an example, an estimated quarter of a million people are living with metastatic breast cancer in the United States.

Metastatic cancer patients are up against a clock – hoping for advances in the treatment of this disease and more time to live well and enjoy their day-to-day lives. For these patients, it's about time. Time to spend with their families, time to cross something off their bucket list, time to simply drive the carpool or cook a meal.
